Washing Vehicles

Where can I wash my customers' vehicles on site?

If your business chooses to wash vehicles on site this must be done in a designated wash bay that is bunded or sloped inwards (eg. contains run-off from the immediate area) and drains to the sewer via an oil water separator or a triple interceptor pit.

If the business does not have an oil water separator or triple interceptor, the washing of vehicles has to be conducted on a surface (gravel or grass) with no risk of run-off to any nearby stormwater drains.

What do I need to remember when washing vehicles?

- You are not permitted to allow soapy water to enter stormwater drains. Even biodegradable soaps must not be allowed to enter stormwater.
- Visible entrances to the stormwater system include: side entry pits, kerbs, gutters and stormwater drainpipes. All lead directly into waterways and into the sea.
- You may only discharge wastewater into the sewer if you have a Trade Waste Agreement or prior approval from your local water authority. Otherwise, you will need an EPA approved transporter to collect the wastewater.
- If your premises is not connected to the sewerage system, then wastewater should be directed to a septic tank. You need a permit for any septic tank with a volume that is less than 5,000 litres, and a licence for tanks over 5,000 litres.

Ways to reduce water consumption and environmental impact

- If possible, subcontract vehicle washing to an existing car wash facility.
- Attach trigger action nozzles to hoses.
- Use a high pressure low volume wash machine in compliance with car washing restrictions.
- Do not wash vehicles in the street or driveway where water runs to stormwater.
- Recycle wastewater by using equipment that allows you to remove contaminants from water.
- Collect and use rainwater for vehicle washing to avoid water restrictions and costs. Your business could do this by installing rainwater tanks.
